Dear Parents & Carers,

It is our job here at Addington to support our families to create that new normal and there are details throughout this newsletter to help you do this.

Our Home Learning pages on our website and Earwig are our ways of keeping in close contact with you and I hope that all the resources and videos have been useful in some way to every pupil, even if it is just to see a familiar face!

Our Creative Arts team have created a Community Music Blog where Rhona and Sean sing many songs for our pupils to join in with and the PE team have also been busy providing exercise videos for the whole family to work out to at home.

Finally, I would like to say how wonderful it has been to see the whole of the Addington community coming together to support each other in this time of crisis; from the lovely emails from parents, to the determination of staff to keep the school open to support our keyworkers, to staff creating amazing videos, to parents attempting home learning and to pupils engaging in home learning as much as they can. Hopefully, over the next 2 months the crisis will pass and we can look forward to all coming back together again in one place.

As you know there is no guidance from the government yet as to when schools will re-open and social distancing rules will be relaxed, but we will keep you updated as much as possible in the hope that this happens sooner rather than later.

In the meantime, I hope you enjoy the pages of this newsletter featuring activities prior to the lockdown and I wish everyone a safe, happy Easter.

Home Learning @Addington

Home learning for pupils at Addington needs to be approached in a personalised way, taking into account the students, their family situation and the situation the class teacher finds themselves in. Due to these reasons I will lay out below the various different ways we are delivering Home Learning. Some of your children will only be accessing one of these ways, others may be able to access several. As this situation develops after Easter we will monitor home learning and make changes and updates where necessary. As teachers, parents and your children get more used to home learning, new techniques and strategies may be tried. For some children the best home learning activities are those related to developing their independent living skills around the home.

Home Learning

- Unless unwell or called into school, Class teachers will be keeping in touch via email every Monday
 morning with potential learning activities and opportunities for the week. This will include relevant
 online links. They will also be in contact with you throughout the week. You can contact Class teachers
 on the emails below. As we develop the use of Earwig class teacher may begin to use this as their main
 communication system.
 - Our teachers will inform you of the current curriculum themes and key aspects of learning appropriate for your child. Class teachers will make suggestions as to activities you can do with your child related to these aspects of learning.
- Our website will be updated regularly, including information regarding reputable educational websites
 or resources platforms that are offering free access for parents. An example of this is Education City:
 There is now a link from our Home Learning page to the login details for this site. We expect class
 teachers to signpost you to these new resources if relevant. Please look at our website regularly as we
 are continually updating it with new and exciting resources.
 - We have been granted full access for parents to Espresso, an online learning resource suitable for many pupils across our school. It is often used in school for daily news articles aimed at primary students, but also suitable for some of our older learners.

 - We have a number of other online learning platforms that are suitable for small groups of our learners. These include DoodleMaths, Education City and Purple Mash. Class teachers will let you know the details if they are relevant/appropriate for your child. To make you aware as a parent there are several online resource website offering free trials and access. - Below you will see a list of dedicated emails set up for you to contact school curriculum leaders if you
 have any questions around learning for your child.
- Our subject specialists, especially our Creative Arts and PE teams are creating a great bank of videos to help engage your children. These videos will be shared with you via Earwig, emails from class teachers or via our Home Learning Page on our website https://addington.schooljotter2.com/pupil-pages/online-learning. It is worth being aware that due to safeguarding concerns we will not be delivering any live teaching via any technology platforms.

Earwig

The most powerful home learning information tool that we have just introduced is Earwig, an online evidence gathering and sharing platform. This will enable the teacher and parents to share pictures and videos between home and school. We launched this on Monday 30th March. By the time you receive this newsletter you should have received a login email from Earwig Academic. If you haven't please email helpline@addington.wokingham.sch.uk.

It has been great to see some of the fantastic photos and videos that our trail blazing teachers and parents have been posting. It has been great to see some of the fantastic activities your children have been getting up to whilst unable to come into school. Thank you to those teachers and parents that have embraced this new technology so quickly.

Your child's teacher will communicate with you by email as to whether they are going to use Earwig or email as their main communication method. Teachers will begin using Earwig when they are confident in its use. We hope most teachers will start using this after Easter.

In these very difficult times, we will do our utmost to ensure we have open lines of communication with you. We will do this in several ways explained below. First and foremost, we will keep our website up to date with our latest responses to the coronavirus crisis and we will also email all parents these updates.

An Addington Student T is the latest recipient to receive a scholarship as part of the Sand Martins Golf Club Feel Inspired Academy Satellite Club for Children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).

The 14-year-old with Downs Syndrome is a pupil at Addington School in Woodley, where he lives.

At the Wokingham club's academy, he has grown in stature and confidence by learning to play golf under the guidance of Sand Martins professional Symon O'Keefe, Academy Satelite Club manager Alan Leason and other coaches.

It was Symon and Alan who recommended T for the scholarship, which was approved by the club's general manager, Matt Short.

T attends the academy each week with his parents.

At Addington, he takes part in several other sporting activities, including tag rugby, swimming, football and orienteering.

A keen supporter of Wolverhampton Wanderers FC, he has represented his school in the national panathlon games, swimming at the Olympic swimming pool in London.

Early Years

All Early Years classes have really enjoyed exploring our theme Traditional Tales and Puppets.



Daisy Class - We have really enjoyed sharing some well-loved stories such as 'Three Billy Goats Gruff', 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears', 'the Gingerbread Man' and most recently 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We have explored themed sensory trays, stimulating all our senses through re-enacting stories and experienced rhythm and repetition through call and response versions of stories. We have enjoyed

exploring different festivals through tasting and cooking. We have also explored different cultural customs through stories and play, for festivals like Chinese New Year and Pancake Day. World Book Day was enjoyed by all with some wonderful outfits and fun stories shared.















Sunflower Class - Sunflower Class have enjoyed exploring 'The Three Little Pigs', 'Goldilocks and The Three Bears' and 'The Enormous Turnip'. We enjoyed acting them out using props and costumes. Many of the pupils also made character masks and enjoyed dressing up as characters. The children have been developing their listening and attention skills during our sensory story



sessions. Many of the children have developed an increased interest in our Call and Response chants too.

This term we started our first Forest School Sessions with a pilot group of students from across Early Years. The students have really enjoyed exploring new environments and taking part in activities in the local woods in their all weather gear.











Tulip Class - Tulip class have enjoyed the stories of the 'Three Billy Goats Gruff' and 'the Gingerbread Man' through Call and Response activities and sensory stories. We also loved exploring the story of the 'Enormous Turnip' during an Early Years Assembly, enjoying pretending to be different characters and helping to try and pull the turnip out of the ground! To celebrate Pancake Day we made pancakes during our cooking lesson and took part in the Inter-House Pancake race which was lots of fun! We have also made gingerbread men in our cooking lessons this term, working on using different tools such as rolling pins and

cutters, and have even been cracking some eggs! The best part was then decorating them with cicing and eating them of course!













Lily Class - Lily Class have been focusing on the story of 'The Three Little Pigs'. We have explored and acted out the story using masks and puppets, made collage pictures and built houses. We have also been using story maps to develop our story telling skills - these have really supported us in

remembering the order of the story and repetitive lines.

We enjoyed World Book Day by dressing up - we had the 'Tiger who came to Tea', 'Paddington Bear', 'Little Bo Peep' and many other book characters. Lynda (Deputy Head) also came to Lily class to share the story of 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' with us! She used a story map to retell the story and encouraged the children to join in with the repeated refrain "who's that trip trapping over my bridge?"

The children have improved their counting and number skills by counting characters and things from the story. We have also been working hard on phonics and reading this term, focusing on the sounds s, a, t, p, i, n, g, o and using symbol reading books.













Daffodil Class - Daffodil Class enjoyed exploring 'The Gingerbread Man'. We practised our fine motor and instruction following skills whilst making gingerbread men in the kitchen. We have played lots of ring games and had fun dressed up as the characters chasing each other, reciting the repeated refrains: "Run run as fast as you can, you can't catch me I'm the Gingerbread Man!"

This was followed by the 'Three Billy Goats Gruff' where we explored lots of sensory, small world story trays, and call and response to help retell the main events of the story. We seemed to have lots of grumpy trolls in our classroom shouting "who's that trip trapping over my bridge?"

Finally, we read the story of 'The Three Little Pigs'. The Big Bad Wolf made an appearance in our Bucket sessions, splatting the pigs, blowing the house materials away and knocking down buildings. We used story maps to help us retell the story with picture prompts and acted out the story in the role play 'Building Site' and knocking blocks down in Soft Play.


Middle School News

We all worked really hard at developing our communication skills through making fruit kebabs, and in our exploratory play sessions. 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







Sycamore Class


Sycamore class have had a fun half term continuing to work on the 'Urban Pioneers' topic. In literacy, they looked at old photos of Reading and then designed their own towns. They enjoyed deciding the buildings, nature, population size and any special features they wanted in their town. The class also learnt about the graffiti artist Keith Haring and created a class mural, using his style, on the panels surrounding the new building.





We enjoyed celebrating World Book Day by dressing up as a book character and writing a book review. We were also read a story called 'Tiddalik the Frog' by the KS3 lead, Lydia.

During 'Life Skills' sessions with Gail, the class practised ironing, polishing and hanging up socks on a drying rack. The class' competitive side was brought out by taking part in weekly sock hanging competitions! It was a race to see who could hang up the most pairs of socks and we practised counting in 2's to see who the winner was. They also worked on hanging shirts, jumpers, and coats on a coat hanger. We worked on life skills in cooking too. The class learnt to make beans on toast as a hot snack this half term. It would be great if Sycamore class could keep practising these skills at home!







Some other things Sycamore class have done include: using Google Maps to find landmarks around the world and more locally, making a wormery and planting potatoes in gardening, and learning about time and weight in maths.

Swan Class News

It has been a busy half-term despite the interruptions and change of learning location, but our students have managed marvellously and we have been impressed at how they have adapted to home learning. See what we have been up to!

Business Enterprise Skills and Work Experience

Our topic for the term has been Fast Fashion and Swan Class worked hard to build their own pop up Recycled Fashion Shop. This involved many home and business Skills. Students brought in or obtained second hand clothing that was then sorted, and laundered where appropriate and categorised ready for sale. Initially the pop up shop was going to be run as a market stall and true pop up shop, in Woodley Town Centre on the 18th March as part of a much larger Artisan Market. Although this event was cancelled at the last minute our entrepreneurial students rapidly built a pop up shop in Swan Classroom for 2 days. They re-marketed the shop with new advertising, and practised their cashier skills before going 'live' on the 17th and 18th March. The pop up shop made £97 profit and was a hit with all the students and staff that came for their bargain purchases.







On a Wednesday afternoon Gail has been running Business Enterprise Lessons, whereby our students have been busy making Cards, Easter and Mothers Days gifts and designing and printing their own T-shirts. The students have learned a whole range of new skills in small scale manufacturing and production, including quality control.







A number of students this term have been involved in Work Experience either at Loddon School or the Farm, where they learnt how to look after a variety of different animals as well as horticulture. Some students have been visiting Birches Café, where they help set up and serve lunches to the residents. Thank you to Stacey for setting up these work experiences.

Fast Fashion

As well as our pop up shop, students have taken part in a host of different activities and experiences as part of our Fast Fashion topic. We have looked at the impact of the fashion industry on the environment as well as designing our own wonderful outfits using recycled products such as crisp packets and old DVD's with Angie and Jules in the Art department.

Using some recycled clothing the students also dressed up in a range of very different outfits and using the Mr Ben Shop idea we went in to the shop in our school clothes and came out 'as by magic' in our new outfit and were whisked off to a suitable setting with camera wizardry provided by Martin to locations such as New York, Disneyland, a Rock Concert and Gotham City!







Life Skills

Cooking on Tuesday has produced some lovely lunches that the students work in a team to make and serve to the whole class. Some of the popular dishes they have been making this term have included Toad in the Hole, Spicy Vegetarian Sausage Pasta Bake, Millies' Cookies, Healthy Homemade Burgers and Veggie Burgers and Oreo Cheesecake. The students' cooking assessment for the term was to independently cook a healthy lunch themselves. They choose from either beans, cheese or scrambled eggs on toast.







We are incredibly proud of the many students (and parents!) who have taken up the challenge of cooking at home for their families, transferring their skills and recipes from school into their homes. There is nothing more satisfying than being able to cook even the simplest dishes or drinks for your family. Thank you to all the parents that have supported their children in cooking at home.

Life skills in the community continues with our weekly shopping trips to the supermarket to purchase ingredients for cookery; this includes budgeting and money skills as well as communication and team working. We have also continued with our trips to the Rainbow Café and for Monday life Skills Group to Bosco Lounge, Costa Coffee and Coffee#1 in Woodley.

These are not only important social events but also helps develop money, life skills and independence. During all our trips into the local community we continually develop Social Sight Words with the focus this term on being supermarket, café, warning, recycling and pedestrian signs.







PE

During our weekly offsite PE lessons, we have been enjoying swimming on a Friday afternoon at the Carnival Pool. These are always very popular sessions with the students, and on a Wednesday morning PE the students have been doing table tennis.

A bizarre but rather popular event was our first School Pancake Race, where Swan class helped and supported other classes in running some of their own pancake races. Great fun for all, and we hope to replicate this every year – most of the pancakes for the races were made by our students!

Home Learning

For the last 2 weeks students have taken up the challenge of moving their learning environments into their homes. It has been lovely not only to hear so much positive news from the parents on how everyone has adapted to this new way of learning, but also to see the photos. Here are some of the things our students have been up to. Keep up the excellent work, and this really could not happen without the support and enthusiasm of our amazing parents – well done.







Owl Class News

Owl Class have been busy on the sensory topic of colours and weather, joining in with the "We're Going on a Rainbow Hunt" sensory story, going through an adventure of different weather until they find the rainbow. This incorporates joining in repetitive refrains accompanied by actions and over the weeks focusing on our senses: sight, touch, hearing, movement, smell and taste. We have enjoyed the adventure on a rainbow hunt, acting out the story, joining in playing instruments and using the props for the sensory story and props made in sensory craft sessions. We used symbols to choose where we were going to go on the journey.

We have made a variety of sensory craft items linked to our sensory theme of weather: windmills for wind, foggy sensory art for fog, raincloud, using marbling technique and cotton wool for rain, a big sensory sunshine for sun and a beautiful sensory rainbow out of coloured fabrics for the rainbow. For the colours topic, we made tie dye art, coloured rice art, marbling art and then weaving rainbows with coloured fabrics.

Our Work Skills Project this term has been running Owl Café, which has involved the students following prompt strips to make icing, decorate biscuits with icing and icing pens, make drinks, wash up and clean tables, serve the food and pour drinks for the students from another class and then join in the eating and drinking too, while socialising with the students from another class. A different class each week has come to our café.

We have continued to go to The Birches Café, to practise what to do in a cafe more independently – remembering how and where to queue, using their communication supports to order their food and drink with decreasing support.

We have been enjoying going to The Ridgeline on Fridays for horticultural therapy. We have been looking for signs of spring in the garden, doing scavenger hunts, learning about birds through games and crafts, cutting dogwood with secateurs for compost and planting bulbs.



Our Upper School Fast Fashion topic has involved the students designing T-shirts by choosing two emojis and then we practiced ironing the creases out of our T-shirt with an adult (or watched an adult). We then helped an adult iron our name and emojis onto the T-shirt. Some of our students went to Peacocks in Woodley to follow their given symbol to find a shirt, T-shirt and trousers. We felt



different fabrics. We liked the fluffy fabric. Some also went to Clarks shoe shop for feet measuring, finding out which shoe size they are.

In PSHE we have been learning where our private body parts are and consent to touch and saying no (using NSPCC guidance).

In Cooking, we have made some lovely lunches including chicken/quorn pie (one of each) and fish risotto. Some of our students have been working on their chopping skills with a small knife and some of our students have been helping to make cakes and

biscuits by pressing a switch to turn on the food mixer.



This term has involved some of our students doing external work experience work placements too. These have included Loddon School, Piazza Café and Sue Ryder. Well done to all of our students doing their internal work experience (Owl Café) and external work experience also at The Ridgeline every Friday.

Developing Life skills being an important part of our curriculum, students have been given the opportunity to practise these everyday skills in using the dishwasher, washing machine and the vacuum cleaner.



Some of the class attended the Links courses at Reading College where they did cooking and Ceramics, while others went to BCA where they did land-based activities (caring for the environment) and were given an insight into animal care, where they helped feed goats, sheep, pigs and chickens.

As is evident and always the case for our young people, it has been another busy half term filled with practical activities, but sadly cut short due to the pandemic. Having made contact with all our parents, it is heartening to note that the familiar upbeat and positive morale and humour still prevails,

We wish that everyone stays safe and we can before too long be together as a class again.
















Robin Class News
