

#### CAR PARKING REMINDER

Thank you to all parents who drop off and/or pick up their child from school for continuing to work with us to make our car park run as smoothly as possible. I have been actively monitoring the car park regularly over the last month and in general it is running smoothly. Below are reminders of key points to help maintain this.



To ensure the continued smooth and safe operation of the busy Addington car park we need all parents who drive their child to school to park in the Bulmershe Leisure Centre car park and walk across the zebra crossing, during drop off/pick up times. We have an agreement in place with Bulmershe Leisure Centre to allow this.

We do recognise that for a small minority of pupils crossing the road will not be possible. Therefore, a limited number of parent passes, allowing access to our car park, are distributed based on an individual's agreed needs; physical, emotional or behavioural.

If you feel you need a car park pass please let your class teacher know, including the reason for needing one. A member of SLT will then allocate a pass or contact you for further discussion/information.

We only have a small number of spaces for parents in our car park, so we will not always be able to give out passes to all parents who would like one.

#### Parents with Passes using the Addington School Car park

- Parents with passes must only park in the allocated bays near the main entrance and not in the main body of the car park where staff park, unless specific arrangements have been made with a member of the leadership team. This is especially important in the morning as some staff start at 9 and sometimes cannot find a parking space.
- Car park passes must be displayed clearly in the windscreen. The two disabled bays near the school are for priority wheelchair users and larger vehicles with tail lifts. Permitted drivers must use the one-way system marked out and only park in marked parent or disabled spaces.
- Unfortunately at busy times we do not have enough parking spaces onsite for all parents with passes.
   Please work with our staff as they manage these situations as efficiently as possible, this is likely to involve being asked to complete one or more circuits of the car park to ensure the car park flow is not disrupted.
- Parents can move the cones on the parent parking and disabled bays in the area near the main entrance, however if there is a cone with a sign on it, only move this if it has been allocated to you. Cones with signs on are to reserve spaces for a particular pupil with a specific need.

#### **General instructions**

- All pedestrians must use the zebra crossings and the pavement when walking around the school car
  park or to and from the site. DO NOT WALK on the road as a short cut. This is very dangerous and
  could result in an accident.
- Parents or carers must not park in the old entrance to Addington (near Bulmershe Leisure Centre) or on the double yellow lines near our old entrance, to drop off or pick up.
- Please leave parking spaces promptly To support the process at the start and end of day to run smoothly, please can I ask that all parents and carers vacate parking spaces in either of the car parks as soon as possible to allow other parents access to the space. If you need to have a discussion with the teacher, please arrange a time to meet in person or have a telephone conversation to free up a parking space as soon as possible.

We have been lucky to have a coach from Berkshire Banshees Wheelchair Rugby Club come to school to run five wheelchair rugby training sessions for Chestnut Class. It is such an inclusive sport, both wheelchair bound and able bodied people can play on a level playing field. The pupils have really enjoyed it and their skills improve week on week.





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#### Bluebell Class

We have had a brilliant term in Bluebell Class! We went on our first ever school trip to Taplow and the children loved it! We had such a great time. Our topic for this term has been Animals, which has been a big hit in our class! In Communication, Language and Literacy we have been looking at 4 different books; Farm 123, The Little Red Hen, to celebrate Eid we looked at Happy Eid Mr Men, and to celebrate the Coronation we looked at Peppa's Coronation. We really enjoyed looking at the pictures of the animals in our story and making the animal noises to match.

We have also been looking after caterpillars this term and we have enjoyed watching them transform into butterflies! During cooking, we have made bread (to link with *The Little Red Hen*), painting sun and moon on bread (to celebrate Eid), and making Eton Mess (to celebrate the Coronation), the children continue to love cooking lessons! In Maths we have enjoyed exploring number through number songs - our favourite is now 12345 once I caught a fish alive! We have also learnt about capacity, time, shape, and position. We are really enjoying our swimming lessons, with most of the children becoming confident to swim on their own! We love Music and Dance here in Bluebell, so our weekly Music lessons with Sean are always a lots of fun! The children have started signing/ singing along to the songs now! We have also started assemblies with Sunflower and Daisy. We are all so proud of how the children have continued to settle into the routines of the school day. We are very excited for our next topic... transport!











#### **Daffodil Class**

Our topic this half term has been *Amazing Animals* and we had a fantastic opportunity to visit Chobham Farm! During the trip, we had experiences to touch and brush the different animals and visit a new Soft Play whilst also trying new activities, including a donut slide and bouncing pillow! Since the farm, we have been using our experiences during our Literacy work by looking back at photos to develop our colourful semantic and shared writing skills.

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We had an exciting week learning about the Coronation where we have looked at photos of the King and experienced activities relating to the Coronation, such as making crowns and having a ceremony during Attention Autism Bucket! We enjoyed celebrating the Coronation with a playground party with the other Early Years Classes, which was a great opportunity for all to develop their communication and sharing skills.











## Daisy Class have been out, out!

If you go down to the woods, you will find... Daisy class! We have loved our weekly forest school outing to Highwood Nature Reserve and the sensory garden. On the way to the woods, we listened to different environment sounds such as the beep from the pedestrian crossing, the brum noises of cars and the chug of a tractor. Inside the woods, we heard birdsong as we set up camp, had a turn on the hammock, touched tree bark and leaves as well as climbed over fallen branches. Exploring the bumpy trails and paths in the woods made us shout out and laugh. After we washed our hands in warm water from the big thermos flask, everyone sat together for a snack in the woods. Not even the rain has stopped us. Dressed in waterproof trousers and jackets we all sheltered under the big, red storm bothy listening to the downpour whilst singing weather songs. Back in class, we celebrated Eid and the King's coronation then explored farm animals through our sensory story, 'The Little Red Hen'. We're all looking forward to our trip to

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## Lily Class

We have had a great start to the summer term in Lily class. Our topic this term has been 'Amazing Animals' and we have engaged in a range of different learning activities. We were very excited when five little caterpillars came to join our class and we have enjoyed learning all about the lifecycle of a butterfly. We are patiently waiting for our butterflies to come out of their cocoons. In literacy, we have been reading the story 'The Little Red Hen' and have enjoyed sharing this story with Daffodil class when they joined us for assembly. We have continued to practice our 1:1 correspondence in maths, as well as exploring capacity, time and positional language through a range of fun, practical activities. We had another great day out at Thames Valley Adventure Park and we also visited Chobham Adventure Farm, where we tried some new activities such as the donut slide!

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## **Primrose Class**

This term in Primrose class we have been learning about *amazing animals*! We have really enjoyed our sensory story based on our topic – *The Little Red Hen*. We have been tasting and enjoying lots of food play based around this story too, such as different types of bread including wraps, toast, bagels and baguettes.

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We have enjoyed lots of other types of food play too, especially some scones with jam and cream!











In our sensory maths we have been pouring and counting jugs of water, as well as singing counting songs such as '1, 2, 3, 4, 5 Once I caught a fish alive', and '5 speckled frogs'. We have also really enjoyed celebrating the King's Coronation by making our own crowns, bunting and having a street party with the rest of Early Years! We had a wonderful time and loved celebrating with music, food and time outside!





#### **Sunflower Class**

This term our topic has been amazing animals and right at the beginning of term we enjoyed a trip to Chobham Adventure Farm. Everyone loved exploring the play equipment, especially the jumping pillows, and visited a wide range of farm animals in the barn. Some of the pupils petted some of the animals too! We have also been learning about the life cycle of the butterfly this term, and have shown great interest in watching our real caterpillars as they have gotten bigger, formed a chrysalis and turned into butterflies. At the start of term we enjoyed learning about Eid and created some brilliant moon and star artwork and made some Eid biscuits! The pupils were really excited to join in with our Coronation street party in the Early Years playground, trying different foods and spending time with peers from other classes. We also loved the story *Peppa Pig and the Coronation*, learning more about Coronation traditions. We have continued to enjoy our regular activities such as swimming, with all the pupils becoming more confident in the pool, and are continuously working on communication skills. Well done everyone!

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## Tulip Class

This term we have enjoyed celebrating Eid, exploring through sensory stories, art and class assembly. All the class enjoyed our trip to Cobham Adventure Farm Park, the highlights being the soft play, sack slide, donut slide and the animals. Make sense theatre has continued. All students, thoroughly engaged in Coronation celebrations and activities. They all looked the part in their crowns, enjoying our street party. We have explored more Waldon based activities and focused on new mathematical language *more or less* when looking at a collection of objects. We have continued to develop our play curriculum by using communication boards to request different toys and they have loved making dens.

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## Marvellous May Yoga with Rainbow Claire

Across the seven Early Years classes and in my lunchtime club with Poppy and Cherry children, **Yoga** has had a ROYAL focus to it. This term we have been moving our bodies in lots of different poses (asanas) to welcome our new King Charles 3<sup>rd</sup>. 


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## Key Stage 2

#### Oak Class

Despite it feeling like a really short half term, we have been having lots of fun with our new "Enchanted Woodland" topic. We have been exploring woodland habitats, what they are made of and who lives there and we are currently in the process of making our very own mini-gardens. We have studied the stories of Little Red Riding Hood, Freddie and The Fairy and one of our favourites: The Gruffalo. The children have enjoyed baking, making and using all our senses to find out and investigate everything about the woods. We are now going for regular trips to the Highwood Nature Reserve and this will continue into next half term. Charlotte has been teaching us about road safety on a Friday and we have been showing Helen how to keep safe on weekly shopping trips to the Co-op where we buy our cooking ingredients. We have learned to "stop, look and listen" when we are out and about and to look for the green man when crossing the road. We celebrated the King's Coronation in style with a round robin of activities to decorate our own crowns and then we had a party with all of our friends!

We are so excited to continue our learning in the sun next half term!













## **Pine Class**

Pine class have enjoyed starting a new topic called *Woodland Tales* this term. In Literacy, our new stories are called 'Stick Man' and 'Little Red Riding Hood'; the children have enjoyed exploring these stories through their senses and through role-play. In Maths, we have focused on key topics such as Length, Time and Weight; the children enjoyed using non-standard measures such as a coat hanger to measure the weight of objects!

★We have been practising our road safety skills in PSHE such as following our four rules 'stop, look, listen, think' at zebra crossings and traffic lights and we have also transferred our money skills from last term to the shops. We have been practising our queuing skills and transference of money to the shopkeeper; the children have thoroughly enjoyed this!

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This term we have celebrated the King's Coronation with a KS2 carousel and tea party in the playground! We enjoyed showing off our crowns and eating yummy food. We also celebrated EID with a KS2 carousel. This term we have been very lucky to have weekly visits from our four-legged friend Bailey! The children have really enjoyed having Bailey in the classroom, learning how to feed him and making him do tricks! We have also enjoyed going to Taplow this term, the better weather has meant we were able to enjoy some time outside! In cooking this term, we are learning how to make shortbread biscuits; this means learning how to weigh ingredients using scales and transferring our oven skills! I am proud of everything Pine class have achieved and are continuing to achieve. Well done Pine class!

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## Willow Class

Willow Class have been thoroughly enjoying this term's topic 'Enchanted Woodland' which has led to us sharing some wonderful stories such as 'Freddie the Fairy', 'Stickman' and 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We have loved making the most of the dry weather by spending time exploring in our own outdoor spaces looking for different plants and minibeasts, taking tree rubbings and planting seeds. We have begun to take our learning adventures off the school site and begun to walk to a local woodland to learn more about the features of woodlands whilst also developing our road safety awareness. We've also extended our walks to the local shop where we have been putting into practise our maths and money skills.

We are loving spending more time with peers from other KS2 classes and have had great fun on two different carousels of activities, celebrating Eid and also the King's Coronation. During our carousels the teachers stay in their own classrooms and provide a fun and engaging task linked to the theme and the pupils move around the classes visiting and participating in all the fun tasks. As we grow our independence skills over the summer term we look forward to continuing our walks in the local community learning to be safe whilst developing our learning.

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All of our Willow pupils have made some amazing achievements from improving their handwriting, learning to count in twos to learning more about our own emotions and finding ways to try to manage our regulation. We are proud of all their progress













## **Rowan Class**

This half term we have been enjoying our *Enchanted Woodland* topic, where we have been looking at real woodland animals, as well as fantasy creatures such as fairies and goblins. We have been sharing a selection of well-known Fairy Tales such as *Jack the Beanstalk*, *Hansel and Gretel* and *Little Red Riding Hood* in Literacy and discussing aspects such as settings, characters, events and any messages behind them. We used standard and non-standard units to measure length and weight in Numeracy, after making reasoned predictions and we continued developing useful methods to help us add quickly and accurately. In Science we have been looking at plants and animals, highlighted from Zoolab visit, where we had the opportunity to handle some exotic creatures such as giant millipedes, cockroaches, snails and corn snakes! We have been exploring the concept of road safety in PSHE and looking after our mental wellbeing in RSE.

We also loved taking part in a carousel of activities in preparation for the Coronation, where we made *Bling for the King* crowns, before having a little Key Stage 2 party. It has been a busy but hugely rewarding first half of the summer term for all!

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## **Poppy Class**

This half term has been very busy with Coronation activities and starting our 'A Bug's Life' theme. It was lovely to be out with the department having lots of messy play with spaghetti and Eton Mess and we did make lots of mess!!

We have been making the most of the sunshine and been outside to play Boccia and skittles. We have made great progress with our grasp and release skills and enjoyed playing against Cherry class!

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As it is becoming warmer outside day by day, we decided to have some sessions in our

classroom courtyard or in the sensory garden.

Everyone really enjoyed the multisensory story "A little bit of help" and we experienced the various noises, bug toys with a lot of fruit and spinach to taste and messy play to explore.

Also, everyone has continued to make progress with their communication skills and physical movement this term as well.

We are so proud of our student's hachievements!



#### Beech class

This term has seemed quite disjointed with lots of bank holidays, not that the team have complained about this!

This half term our text has been the new David Walliams' book *Robodog* and *James and the Giant Peach*. Our theme is *minibeasts*, and we have been looking after caterpillars to watch the transformation to beautiful butterflies. When they leave the butterfly net we are hoping for a warm and sunny day to release them in our field.

In PE, in anticipation of the warmer weather, fingers crossed! we have started doing cricket, learning the bowling, batting and fielding techniques. Luckily, the rain has held off for our Thursday session!

We continue to cook once a week. This half term we have made homemade crisps and chocolate in a mug, this lesson continues to be led by the students who follow the set of instructions and equip themselves with the correct equipment and ingredients. Both of these recipes have proved very popular. We are still walking to the shops on a Monday to purchase the ingredients. The students are now taking the list, finding the items, (some of which are quite tricky to find!) queueing and completing the exchange.

★In PSHE we have focused on keeping safe, in different environments and scenarios, i.e. out and ★about, online, in the home. The students have been fantastic at identifying potential dangers and ★identifying safe people.















## **Holly Class**

It has felt like a short half term with all of the bank holidays within it. The pupils have coped well with this change to their routine. We have also changed our timetable to increase the level of demand for some of the pupils. This has been received well and the pupils have taken to the slight changes. This term our topic is 'Bug's Life.' Our shared text to go with this theme is James and the Giant peach by Roald Dhal, which we have adapted to make the story shorter. Resonace board stories continue to a positive experience for the class and often brings us together as a class. This term our story is 'The Quiet Cricket' by Eric Carle. Some pupils enjoy listening to the story and the feel of the vibrations from the board and others are beginning to copy the actions from the lead adult.

During Attention Autism and Explore sessions we have explored painting with 'worms' (cooked spaghetti!), making spiders out of Oreo biscuits and creating ladybirds using potato mashers. In Cooking we have been making 'Peach Eton Mess'. We have focused on the skill of cutting where pupils have cut up peaches. The squirty cream was a huge favourite during this session with some pupils being creative and using the cream to write with!

Some pupils in Holly have begun to develop their play skills by tolerating playing alongside each other during our floortime sessions. It has been lovely to see this develop over the half term. We also enjoyed celebrating the King's Coronation by carrying out a range of activities. We ended the week with a department street sensory party. This was hugely successful and was great for all 4 classes within the department to come together. The adults weren't so keen on the clean up though as it got a little messy!

## **Lime Class**

In Lime class this term, we have focused on exploring nature and bugs! The pupils have had the chance to explore finding worms in soil during our Messy Play sessions. They have explored the woodland area in our weekly Camp Mohawk trips. They all really enjoyed building their own gardens during our fine motor skills activities. They have all done a fantastic job!

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## Birch Class

Birch class has been exploring a "Bug's Life" this half term; a perfect topic for messy play!! With our sensory story "a little bit of help" we are learning many things about bugs, and we are exploring lots of different foods every week.

Finally, we have been working very hard to be as independent as possible; we love helping our friends with their tasks and we can focus very well to do our academic work too.















#### **Key Stage 3**

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## **Aspen Class**

Aspen class have been very busy since returning from Easter!

We have started the topic 'Where we live'. We are learning facts about our local area and building our own 3D maps to help us learn where important locations are. In maths, we are learning about length and weight and are using our new skills to measure different objects around school and compare them to each other. In maths, we are also focussing on number to continue to revisit our prior learning. In literacy, we are looking at two different books: Lost and Found, the boy who Sailed the World, and a third surprise book all about tortoises! In RHSE we are learning about consent and personal space. In science we are also looking at plant life cycles. For PE we have started learning how to play cricket.

This half term has been so busy and we are really enjoying delving into our topic with some hands on learning. Check out the pictures of us enjoying ourselves.















## **Chestnut Class**

This term in our *Where We Live* topic, we have been using globes and atlases to learn about the world and its continents and oceans. The students then chose which countries they wanted to learn more about, so we researched and wrote Fact Files about Poland and Japan. We then learnt about the countries within the United Kingdom, their capital cities and flags. Then we focussed on our country, its traditions, famous landmarks and other interesting facts, ready to write our own information texts.

Chestnut Class have been developing their independence skills this term, learning to read and follow instructions to make basic meals such as tuna pasta and beans on toast. They have also been practising life skills such as putting a pillow case and duvet cover on, loading/unloading the dishwasher, washing up, dusting and hoovering as well as tying shoe laces.

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We have enjoyed our trips to Camp Mohawk every third week, exploring and learning in the great outdoors.

We have also been very fortunate to have been given the opportunity to be taught to play Wheelchair Rugby. We have thoroughly enjoyed the first 2 of 5 sessions – every student has impressed us with their determination, resilience and teamwork to get the most out of this experience. 












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### **Kite Class**

Eagle class wishes all a restful, safe and enjoyable half term break.






















## **Kestrel Class**

## **Creative Arts**

Summer is here and we are so pleased to announce events like Proms and Special Superstar will take place next half term. Information about these events are down below.

#### Music

Early Years have been going to the zoo this half term. They have been copying actions to animals, turning turns to pick the next animal movement like 'stomping like an elephant' or 'waddling like a penguin'. They have been exploring playing different rhythms using bass chimes along to a song about an elephant marching around. Students have enjoyed our song about a hippopotamus, exploring the sound 'mmm' and singing the word 'mud' using a microphone. They have also explored playing a variety of percussion instruments including a djembe.

In KS2 and 3, students have been learning about music through the theme of The Commonwealth. They have sung a call and response based song from Ghana entitled 'Kye Kye Kule', headed to India to sing 'Govinda' and learn about composing tala rhythms, and stayed here in the UK to sing 'Hey Jude' by The Beatles as well as explore some classic British songs through the use of rhythm sticks, such as 'Sailor's Hornpipe'



and 'London Bridge is Falling Down'. We have also headed to Jamaica to learn about reggae music with Bob Marley's 'Three Little Birds'. Some classes broke the music down into different parts, learning to play the bass, melody and harmony parts, and put together a class band performance.

In our Sensory and Complex Needs music lessons we have been exploring music from The Lion King. The pupils' prior knowledge of the songs has enabled them to be proactive with their music making faster than usual, and smiles appear across the room every week when we open with the super-famous 'nants ingonyama!' opening line from 'The Circle of Life'. Pupils have enjoyed exploring wooden instruments during 'Hakuna Matata', vocalising and singing along with 'Can You Feel The Love Tonight', cueing music with switches during 'I Just Can't Wait to be King, and



drumming during 'Stampede'. We look forward to continuing with 'The Lion King' after half term.

KS4 students have also been exploring 'Three Little Birds' by Bob Marley. They learnt the bass line using guitars, some learning a guitar chord, and strumming in a reggae style. They have also learnt the melody line using the keyboards along to a keyboard backing track. Students have also been researching somebody in the arts who inspires them and presenting their findings to their peers. They have found out 5 facts about their chosen person, reflected upon why they chose them and spent time rehearsing their presentations before presenting.


In 6<sup>th</sup> Form, the community group have led a workshop to Rowan class which was successful. They are now planning to visit local schools in the area to lead workshops next half term.

#### Art

This half term Key Stage 3 have been creating maps. Linking into the topic 'Where we live', Sycamore, Elm and Chestnut Class began by



mapping out our local area by illustrating land, water and road areas. We have used symbols to approximately locate key landmarks. Using this knowledge, we have now begun work on a large scale, collaborative map of Reading and surrounding areas. By referencing a real map, we are thinking about what places are North, South, East and West and working with mixed media, exploring lots of different materials, to produce drawings, prints and textures to represent different areas of landscape and specific landmarks. Maple and Aspen are also exploring mixed media to create both a collaborative map of our school, and also lots of individual artwork based on map imagery.





In Key Stage 4, we have started the third round of Stop Motion animations! Characters and sets are almost all complete, with some students even finished with their filming!

Key Stage 4 also helped 6<sup>th</sup> Form make some of the tiles for our King Charles III Coronation art display.



6<sup>th</sup> Form are continuing the classroom canvas brief. We have started the Art room and Workshop canvases by making lots of crayons and tools. We have also been studying cacti – making prints and clay sculptures.





#### **Drama**
